

## FINALE TO ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SEASON!

The Richmond Chapter of the American Guild Of Organists completed its 104th season of service with the annual New Organist Scholarship Student recital at Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church on May 9, 2016. Three students were joined by their teachers in a wonderful recital that included works by Bach, Pachelbel, Vierne, Buxtehude, Rheinberger and others. Following the scholarship student recital, chapter member Steve Henley led a brief program entitled "New Music for Worship," which included recently published organ works as well as two pieces for organ and violin. He was joined by Naima Burrs, violinist. The chapter's annual election of officers occurred prior to the musical programs.

Highlights of this past season included an organ crawl to historic Petersburg churches, recital series performances by Ahreum Han, Scott Dettra and Christopher Houlihan, an informative presentation by Dr. Ann Labounsky, monthly lunchtime open console at several interesting Richmond churches, and a multitude to educational programs and demonstrations presented by our members as part of our monthly meetings.

## THE DEAN'S LETTER TO MEMBERS

It was fun seeing the festivities on Colorado Avenue on New Year's Eve in preparation for the Rose Parade the next day. People were clustered in sleeping bags and tents on the streets; vendors were selling food; benches were set in place for seats in the morning. Music was booming from radios; there were loud noise-makers; everything you would expect to prepare for festivities. Everything went past us in backwards motion as we crawled our way down Colorado Avenue, seated in the bumper seat of our neighbor's station wagon.

Through the years, I have experienced a kaleidoscope of activities at the Rose Parade. I have spent December 31 on Colorado Avenue with the youth group from church. With college friends, I have gotten up long before dawn to get a spot at the beginning, where it was so cold that the band couldn't play and the Rose Parade Queen and her Court were all wearing coats. I have been at home, cooking our traditional New Year's Dinner, watching the parade on TV, then driving to the middle of the parade and enjoying the swirl of the bagpipes, the floats and the horses and the bands. I've been at the end where all the floats rest at the end of the parade, and I've been at the beginning in the large area working on assembling the floats. What fun it was during the parade to see the float upon which we had worked. And, seeing the various Grand Marshals through the years: famous people we only saw on television!

The Richmond Chapter this year has been like that parade. We have had our Grand Marshals of Concert Artists this year through the Organ Repertoire Recital Series: Ahreum Han, Scott Detra and Christopher Houlihan. There were floats in the Rose Parade: carefully crafted, award-winning, breathtaking in their use of foliage to create a completed whole, built around a theme. Our programs this year were outstanding, like each of those floats:

The programs were held at various churches in Richmond: Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church; River Road Presbyterian Church; St. James's Episcopal Church; St. Luke Lutheran Church; St. Michael's Episcopal Church; Trinity Lutheran Church; and Westminster Presbyterian Church. During the Petersburg Organ Crawl, we visited: Gillfield Baptist Church; Trinity United Methodist Church; Tabb Street Presbyterian; St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Bristol Parish; Washington Street United Methodist Church; and, Second Presbyterian Church. The parade continues with the Dean's Organ Tours. We have been enriched with the the incredible hospitality of organists in churches in and around Richmond: Leigh Street Baptist Church; St. Michael's Episcopal Church; St. Bridget Catholic Church; Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church; Cannon Chapel, University of Richmond; Chester Presbyterian Church; and, Emmanuel Episcopal Church.

And, the parade continues with the gifts of music that are brought through our members to the community through organ and choral concerts. Each week, many of us are engaged in church and synagogue music, and if I could count the number of people who are blessed by our music ministry, it would literally number into the thousands.

No parade is complete without the onlookers, and this year, we have reached out to the community of Richmond through publicity for the programs, the New Organist Development Committee, and the Organ Consultation Committee. The Communications Committee continues to inform us and the public with their publications, website and emails. To each of these and all the other committees, we owe a tremendous debt of gratitude.

And, next season, the "parade" will continue, and will conclude with our exciting Region III Convention right here in Richmond! With our eyes on the past, let us enjoy all that the future brings!

## DID YOU KNOW?

According to an article by Robert R. Elbert, which appeared on the PipeOrgan.com industry website, pipe organ builders have entered the 21st century as a vibrant, active, and busy industry. Elbert reports that the industry consists of about 50 firms that regularly build new pipe organs and rebuild older instruments and over 200 shops that provide services from regular tuning to major repair and rebuilding of instruments. Industry sales total close to \$70 million annually.

Each year between 100 and 120 new pipe organs are built in the U.S. and Canada. They range in size from two or three ranks to over 100 ranks. During the past decade, the general trend has been for new pipe organs to become larger. In the early 1990s the median sized (half larger, half smaller) new pipe organ was about 20 ranks. By 2002, the median sized organ was 26 ranks.

As has been true for centuries, churches are the primary market for new pipe organs. In a typical year 85% of new pipe organs are installed in churches. About 10% are installed in colleges, universities, and public auditoriums and about 5% are installed in residences.

Elbert goes on to say that in addition to building new pipe organs, an important part of industry activities is the rebuilding of older instruments. While an organ's pipes and cabinetry can last for centuries, some of the inner mechanisms that are subject to constant friction need rebuilding after several decades. Rebuilding and updating of older pipe organs (usually 40 years old or more) is an economical and musically effective way to extend the pleasure derived from a pipe organ for many decades. Often a rebuild, which gives a church a virtually new instrument, can be accomplished for a fraction of the cost of a totally new instrument. In a typical year about 100 major rebuilds of pipe organs are completed in the U.S. and Canada. In addition, each year many instruments have sets of pipes added and/or upgrading of the console and minor refurbishing completed.

These statistics shared by Mr. Elbert, would indicate that organists have a bright outlook for employment, since every investment in a new or refurbished organ would seem to indicate that one or more organists will be employed to play each instrument. While he paints a rosy picture with regard to new and refurbished instruments, his article does not address the organs that are abandoned or removed from churches, educational institutions and places of public assembly each year. As Richmonders, we can easily question whether the landmark Altree Theatre organ will ever be reinstalled, or whether we will come to work one morning only to find that we have been replaced by a praise band. It would appear then that our greatest mission is keeping the organ and its music alive, and performing our duties in such a way as to make our audiences demand that organ music remain a part of worship in our local churches.
