REMEMBERING OUR DEPARTED COLLEAGUES

This past month was not kind to the organ world, as we note the passing of a number of our friends and colleagues. Among the departed are organists Gerre Hancock, Kay McAbee, and our own Joan Gillespie. Another notable figure in the organ world who left us is organ builder Hans-Erich Laukhuff.

Gerre Edward Hancock, known to many as the organist and choirmaster of St. Thomas Church on New York's Fifth Avenue, and as a noted composer and professor of music at University Of Texas. Austin, was one of America's most popular recitalists, teachers and lecturers. A graduate of the University of Texas and Union Theological Seminary, he often performed along with is wife, Dr Judith Hancock. Dr. Hancock was known throughout the world for his concert work and improvisation workshops. He passed from this life on January 21, 2012, at the age of 77, as a result of coronary artery disease. Following a February 4th Memorial service, Hancock's cremated remains were enshrined in the choir loft of St. Thomas, at the location where he stood to direct the choir for so many years.

Kay McAbee, a veteran theatre organist and teacher in the Chicago area, was noted for his silent movie and concert work as well as prior work as one of radio's golden age organists. McAbee passed away on January 8, 2012 in .Albuquerque, NM. On the classical and church side, Kay was a member of the American Guild of Organists for 50 years, choir master and organist at St. Peter's United Church of Christ in Frankfort, Illinois for 23 years and most recently, organist for Covenant United Methodist Church. During his lifetime, he recorded several theatre organ LP's, and in his later years, he performed regularly at Chicago's Rialto Theatre and frequently in Las Vegas as well.

Joan Kilpatrick Gillespie, 76, of Richmond, passed from this life January 26, 2012 surrounded by her family. A native of Greenville, S.C., Joan married her soul mate, Gene Gillespie in 1954. They moved to Richmond where she studied music at VCU. She pursued her passion by teaching piano to thousands of students and was an organist for many local churches. She was an active member of the American Guild of Organists, Richmond Music Teachers Association and Richmond Music Study Club. Joan's passing is a great loss to Richmond and to the organ world.

Hans-Erich Laukhuff, Managing Director of August Laukhuff Organ Builders of Germany, was a also a noted figure in the organ world In addition to the many fine organs built by the firm, Laukhuff was well known internationally as a supplier of specialized organ builders' tools and organ components. Many church organs utilize blowers, keyboards and controls manufactured by the German firm. Laukhuff's death occurred on February 8, 2012

Boyd Jones performs extensively throughout the United States on both organ and harpsichord in addition to his duties as University Organist and John E. and Aleise Price Professor of Organ at Stetson University, DeLand, Florida. Recent seasons have included performances for two regional conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the national convention of The Organ Historical Society, a conclave of the Southeastern Historical Keyboard Society and the national convention of the Music Teachers National Association. Many recitals have been performed for colleges and universities, AGO chapters and churches from California to Maine to Florida. Engagements abroad have included recitals in Japan, and in 2007 a series of recitals in Bulgaria. Additionally, he has performed frequently as both organ and harpsichord soloist, and as a continuo player with several prominent orchestras.

The author of articles for numerous publications, Jones was the American correspondent for the English journal Choir and Organ, providing articles on American organ builders in each issue for three years. He has also served as consultant for several significant organ projects.

Dr. Jones holds degrees from Stetson University (BM) where his organ teacher was Paul Jenkins, and from Yale University (MM, MMA, and DMA), where he studied organ with Charles Krigbaum and harpsichord with Richard Rephann, and served as Assistant University Organist and Graduate Teaching Assistant. He has also studied with Harald Vogel at the North German Organ Academy and with Robert Noehren. Dr. Jones has won both national and international organ performance competitions. He has recorded for Arkay Records and is represented by WindWerk Artists.

Dr. Couch has presented at numerous international, national, and regional conferences, including both national conferences of the American Guild of Organists (AGO) this year. As the 2007 Nelson visiting scholar at Northwestern College, Couch also enjoys presenting lectures to the local AGO chapters and to the public. Dr. Couch has been the recipient of numerous grants for his scholarship, performances, teaching, and public service. He is also active in several musical organizations (AGO, AMS-SW, CMS-SW, ICMC, and TSMT) and as a church musician. He will be represented by Concert Artist Cooperative. In 2009 the respected label Pro Organo released his solo recording Hamburger Rhetoric, which features dramatic music and musical settings of the Lord's Prayer by Bach, Buxtehude, Mendelssohn, and others. ST. BRIDGET ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH TO RECEIVE NEW ORGAN

An article in the February, 2012 issue of The Diapason, announces that John-Paul Buzard Pipe Organ Builders has been awarded a contract to construct a new organ for St. Bridget Church in Richmond. The builder's Opus 42 will feature 32 speaking stops and 38 total ranks across three manuals and pedal. The installation will also uncover a stained glass window that has been hidden for over 35 years by the present organ case. It will feature a divided Swell to the left and right of the window, as well as a Great division to be placed in front of the gallery rail. Completion is expected following Easter of 2013. The parish Director of Music and Liturgy is Allen Bean, and Grant Hellmers is providing consulting services for the project.

AGO EDUCATION CONCERNS

National AGO has given us ten reasons to become certified in organ playing from them. The very first one states: "The Guild has provided a ready-made program for you to develop and improve your organ skills. Preparation for the exams strengthens you in areas that you use all the time: sight reading, transposition, modulation, improvisation, accompaniment and hymn playing." Since all of my organ instruction has been through private instruction and playing has been an avocation, working through these listed skills in preparing for the SPC has made me think about things from my Harmony classes in college as well as putting to use some things we learned in Music Theory class. Think of these certificates in this manner: If you were like me and liked to play but your college did not offer music degrees, this is one way to "show you know" some of the things those fortunate to have gone to University for organ and music degrees have learned in their classes.

NEWS FROM RAVEN CDs

The Organs of Aristide Cavaillé-Coll is a DVD/CD documentary now being completed by the British film maker Will Fraser who, through his firm Fugue State Films, has produced several very well-received organ documentaries, including the very famous one on Bach's "Art of Fugue" with George Ritchie and Christoph Wolff and also a magnificent set on the organs of Groningen with Sietze de Vries, Cor Edskes, and Jürgen Ahrend, among others. Pre-manufacture subscription purchase of the upcoming Cavaillé-Coll documentary is available now at a lower price than will prevail soon before delivery begins. Completion and delivery are anticipated in late 2012, perhaps as early as the Fall.

This production will be the first ever full-length documentary about Aristide Cavaillé-Coll's life and work. The documentary will be accompanied by many recordings and filmed performances of works by Franck, Saint-Saëns, Guilmant, Boëllmann, Widor and Vierne on several Cavaillé-Coll organs – expect to see St. Sulpice, St. Ouen, St. Sernin, and more. Fine players have already been filmed and recorded including famous French titulaires as well as leading English organist Gerard Brooks. The set will include a fully illustrated booklet with photos, details and specifications of all the organs and essays about the composers and music.

DID YOU KNOW?

This month's organ in a strange and interesting place, was created for use in a California cemetery. No, we're not talking about a mortuary chapel organ! This gargantuan instrument was actually installed outdoors on the cemetery grounds. When the Wurlitzer company installed the instrument for Roosevelt Cemetery in Los Angeles, newspaper articles at the time proclaimed that the organ's sound could be expected to wake the dead. While there is no record of that having actually happened, the organ could easily be heard over five miles away from the cemetery grounds. Operating on 35 inches of wind pressure, Wurlitzer was required to redesign and modify the organ after installation in order to prevent chests from rupturing and pipes from blowing off of the toe boards. Huge metal clamps were installed in order to keep the chests from separating, and specially designed water jets were incorporated into the blower in order to cool the overly heated wind, which resulted from compression to the 35 inch static pressure needed to run the organ.



One interesting feature was the underground bunker built to house the console (shown below at left). The bunker was needed to protect the organist's hearing from damage while playing. A standard four manual Wurlitzer horseshoe console was placed ten feet underground in this concrete lined pit, and it was from this almost soundproof vantage point that the organist controlled the beast. The photo above is from the 1926 dedication of the instrument when 5000 people gathered on the cemetery grounds to experience it's fury first hand. At right below is a photo of actress Priscilla Dean standing on the 32 foot diaphone Low-C pipe which was reported to have damaged foundations in neighboring houses, and vibrated tomb stones out of the ground. While the organ was a constant source of problems because of the exposure to weather extremes, and the extreme pressures used, it was operated daily for



many years. Last year, the cemetery operators decided to construct an addition, and the organ, which is on the National Register, was quietly removed in the dead of night and placed into storage in a secret location, much to the chagrin of preservationists and organ buffs. This month, an announcement appeared offering the organ for sale. While it is questionable if a suitable home could ever be found for such an incredible instrument, it has been recommended as a possible transplant for a large open-air stadium or hockey arena. Truly a one-of-a-kind instrument, Roosevelt Cemetery's Wurlitzer Opus 998 remains as one of the strange and interesting organs of the American Industrial Era.
