HELEN KEMP, 'MOTHER OF THE CHILDREN'S CHOIR MOVEMENT' HAS DIED

Helen Kemp worked for almost 80 years as a singer, teacher, choir director and composer. In 1949 she founded the Choristers Guild, which turned into a nationwide movement. Hundreds of US professionals owed her their first musical experience. Helen, who was 97 at the time of her death, had been professor of voice and church music at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, where her late husband, John, headed the church music department. MEET OUR NEW DEAN

Greetings:

Connecting the dots on a piece of paper was always a fun game for my children on long road trips, going to see grandparents. They would put a lot of dots in the form of a square, and connect them. My life story is scattered, like dots on a page, and I would like to bring out highlights as it affects my relationship with you, our members.

Non-Guild, Part-time Organist Years: 1975-1983 and 1987-1997

These were the years I was active as a regular part-time organist and substitute organist in California: Napa, Healdsburg, Santa Rosa, San Diego; Chicago. During those years, I didn't even know the AGO existed, with one exception. There was a program held at my church by the Guild. They mentioned the Guild, and I asked about it. They said it was about finding organ jobs. I had a job, and at the time, played for three churches, so I didn't think I needed it.

Non-Guild, Non-Organist Years: 1983-1987

I lived in Nairobi, Kenya, but had no time to practice on the organ at All Saints' Cathedral, because I was teaching 16 hour days. Believe me, the first thing I did was to go to the Cathedral with my music and shoes. I think I practiced there maybe three times, and then, it was just impossible. We returned to America, and I couldn't play the organ. I hired a babysitter to take care of our son, and practiced every day, until I was comfortable again.

Guild Member, Organist Years: 1997-2015

I have lived in Chicago, Boston and Richmond. I joined the AGO when I was a student of Maggie Kemper at Northwestern. Since then, I have been active on the Executive Committees of Chicago (also Secretary), Boston (also Yearbook Coordinator) and Richmond. In Richmond, I have been active as Sub-Dean, Member-at-Large; I have been on the following committees: Program, Communications, Membership, Recital Series. I was the editor of the "Stoplist" for six years, and the editor of the Directory for two years. When I first arrived in Richmond in 2003, I was still busy raising our daughter, so I was the newsletter editor. I didn't go to many meetings, because I was at orchestra practice with her, or in the Shenandoah Valley visiting our son at boarding school.

Since 1975, I have played at churches large and small, full-time and part-time. I have been there for weddings, funerals, High Holy Days, and church services. I am comfortable on Hammond, electronic, electro-pneumatic and tracker organs. During this time, I have attended Organ Academies, given concerts, and have kept practicing and learning all the time. It's fun!

Connecting the Dots:

Like the dots on the page that my children made, my life has been full of a variety of experiences. I hope that I will be able to connect with you, in whatever capacity you serve: full-time, part-time, raising children, reviving the organ after years away from it. I have a special place in my heart for the part-time organist, who works, has children, is going to school, etc. I have a special place in my heart, also, for working organists who don't know about us, or who are unable to join us for any reason. The Guild is about more than getting a job. It is about friendships that form the tight net of collegial bonds that keep our profession a place of vitality and energy. I hope that you will reach out to others around you and find creative ways to invite people to join our fellowship.

2017 REGIONAL CONVENTION NEWS

Whew – what a busy summer for the 2017 Convention planning.....

The summer started in late June with my attendance at the 2015 Regional Convention in Pittsburgh, along with Steven Henley, Judy Fiske, Tom Bailey, Mary Stutz, and Mary Beth Bennett. As with all conventions, top-quality organ music was the order of the day, with a great mix of a silent movie accompaniment, a handbell recital, an interesting exhibition hall, good workshops, a recital by a Baroque instrumental group, a concert by our very own Mary Beth Bennett, and Chanticleer to end everything. Oh, and don't forget the dinner cruise on the Monongehela River, just as the rain and overcast weather cleared out. The Pittsburgh chapter really 'pulled out all the stops' for the Convention, and we all came away with some good thoughts, observations, and ideas that will be considered for our 2017 Convention.

Our chapter was responsible for providing the invitation to the 2017 convention to all in attendance. There were several ways in which we did this. First and foremost, we were allowed an exhibition space to promote 2017 Richmond. Because we didn't have program information, we showcased the many new and restored instruments in the city, and the tourism appeal of the general area, encouraging members to 'come early and stay late.' I was also afforded the opportunity to verbally invite the attendees by speaking at the Region's breakfast meeting. I don't think they'd ever heard a Richmond Southern drawl ("y'all come") on a New York Yankee before!

Some of the Committees have worked hard over the summer – the Steering Committee met several times this summer, the Fundraising Committee met to set its work plan and timeline, and the Programs & Events Committee has met several times, with invitations already going out to artists and workshop presenters.

While we are still many months away from this project's culmination, there are two things that we need the membership to keep in mind.

First, financial support will be absolutely necessary from the chapter members. Foundations and other corporate donors will ask about the strength of the support from chapter members for this project, and the Fundraising Committee needs to be able to show that the membership is unreservedly supporting the convention with its financial contributions. I hope you consider the 2017 Convention in your annual charitable gifts for all three years – 2015 / 2016 / 2017. (Yes, support will be deductible, since the convention is a program of the chapter.)

Second, we will be needing as many members as possible to provide volunteer support during both the planning and the execution stages of this project. If you are contacted and/or we issue a 'call to arms,' we hope all will be interested, willing, and able to help with time and efforts. In a few months, we'll have a better idea of the tasks, the timeline, and the specific steps needed. I hope you begin thinking about what you might be interested in doing and will be ready when we ask for your help.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM COMMITTEE CHAIRS



I am Judy Fiske, the Membership Chairperson for the Richmond Chapter of AGO. I have been a member of this chapter for 35 years and have served in many different roles from cook to recitalist to Dean. I have served in several different roles at Tabernacle Baptist Church, 1925 Grove Ave, for the same number of years. My current position is Organist, Minister of Music and Worship. I am originally from Lynchburg, Virginia. My educational experience includes a B.A. from Mary Washington College (University), a M.C.M. from The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, a D.Min. from The Baptist Theological Seminary of Richmond and a lot of life learning. My role as Membership Chairperson has given me the opportunity to get to know the members of the Richmond Chapter in unique manner. My name is Mary Campbell and I am the Educational Concerns Coordinator for Richmond Chapter AGO. I arrange the locally administered Service Playing Exam and the Colleague Exam which are recorded and sent in to National to be graded. I am a member of the New Organist Development and POE committees and am to serve as a liaison to the Program Committee (to help propose program topics). If anyone wishing to take an exam or set up a study session, I can organize that for you. I purchase, at my own expense, materials to show what the exam pieces are so members may peruse them. I have a portable display and invite applicants to my home to play the material so they can determine what pieces they might like to learn for an exam. This is in lieu of a chapter library. I may contact our Regional III Educational Coordinator if needed. If Richmond's Executive Board decided to have Richmond be a testing center for the Choirmaster, Associateship or Fellowship exams, I would be the contact person with National to arrange for such exams here. I am also the contact person with National AGO if the Richmond AGO Executive Board decided to sponsor a Pipe Organ Encounter.

I would encourage you to consider taking one of the AGO exams this year. If you plan to play the Service Playing Exam, ask National for an application and submit it between Sept 1, 2015 and Feb. 1, 2016. You have from October 1, 2015 to March 31, 2016 to actually play the exam. Would you rather do the Colleague Exam? Then you would ask National for an application and submit it by Sept. 15, 2015 for the Nov. 13, 2015 exam date or submit it by March 1, 2016 for the May 13, 2016 exam date. In either case, you need to ask National for a PDF file of the Exam Booklet as it contains the hymns you will need for choosing material for both the Service Playing and Colleague exams.

And now for my regular monthly article: "Ready for the rests?"

I was a party to a discussion on 'Linked in' about names for notation. I have seen the word minim and the word crotchet in pieces for my organ lessons and when this discussion came along I joined right in. A very kind lady from Ireland gave me a website and there was a chart listing names used in other places for notation. I thought I might pass along some of what I have learned about this. In England a double whole note is a breve or brevis, a whole note is a semibreve, a half note is a minim, a quarter note is a crotchet, an eighth note is a quaver, a sixteenth note is a semiquaver, a thirty-second note is a demi-semiquaver, a sixty-fourth note is a hemidemisemiquaver and a one hundred twenty-eighth note is a semihemidemisemiquaver or a quasihemidemisemiquaver. Be looking for them in future articles! **The entire chart can be viewed on line at:**

land-locked in a city block, but still with vital ministries and music programs. In one of the Catholic churches, I actually felt the 32' pedal from console in the rear gallery shaking the floor under the pews in the front. The artists played a variety of repertoire, and I was absolutely amazed at the youth, strength, education, and experience of some of them (I overheard one of the young artists lamenting how very old he was – he's already 26!). The workshops I attended were very interesting, especially the choral reading seminars – I think everyone left with some music they could use in their own programs.

As we often just sat and watched the people go by, it was evident to me that many organists form lifelong friendships, and that these conventions are like an old fashioned Homecoming. My friend and I were especially inspired by a retired member of the Pittsburgh chapter. She used a walker, and had her daughter with her, carrying a tote bag and helping her up the steps and into seats. Every day she was dressed head-to-toe in a jewel-tone color – turquoise, pink, royal blue – shoes and brimmed hat included, a real Southern lady in Pittsburgh! She didn't miss any concert or event, rode the busses with the rest of us, and even went on the river cruise. We spoke to her and found out that she used to be very active in the Chapter and on the bench, but is now retired.....and she had just celebrated her 89th birthday!! May we all be as full of life and joy as she clearly is!

Choristers Guild Institute

This summer I had the pleasure of serving on the faculty of the Choristers Guild Institute at Wingate University in Wingate, NC. This is an intensive, week-long training session for directors of children's and youth choirs. Participants come for three summers to gain certification from the program and keep in touch with faculty through mentoring assignments and video feedback throughout their three years. Each day of the institute consists of morning and evening worship, and classes in choral techniques, pedagogy, choral conducting, vocal modeling, and a variety of special topic seminars. Participants also take part in worship planning groups to design the services throughout the week. If you work with children or youth choirs it is a fantastic way to meet other colleagues in the field, gain confidence, find repertoire, and learn new teaching strategies with those age groups as well as hone your own conducting and singing skills. Hymn Society Conference

Despite the temperature and humidity - both around 100 - the annual conference of the Hymn Society of the United States and Canada on the campus of Loyola University in New Orleans July 12-16 was an exciting, enjoyable and thought-provoking experience. I did not get to attend all the events, but did make all the Plenaries: 1) Praising God from the Margins, by Miguel and Deborah De La Torre, raising the question of what are we doing outside of our comfort zones; 2) The new online international Canterbury Dictionary of Hymnology, by Carlton ("Sam") Young, organizer and editor of the American entries (many authors of which - including yours truly - were in attendance); 3) Psalmody and Hymnody in Jewish Congregational Singing (a real eye-opener for me) by John H. Baron; 4) Spirituals and Gospel Songs in African American Congregational Singing, by Roy Belfield, Jr. These were all morning presentations with no conflicts - quite different from the Sectionals, where one had to select from eight offerings. I chose A New Hymnal for the Netherlands, with Wim Ruessink, who was also the organ recitalist on the opening afternoon. This is an amazing eclectic volume serving multiple church bodies which traditionally had little to do with each other. Hymn-Based Organ music for Worship, with David Furniss at Temple Sinai - on an untouched E.M. Skinner organ (from 1927?), The Organist and Songleading: An Imaginative Responsibility, with Eric Wall (Is the organ the most helpful instrument for this hymn?), Mental Health and Hymns that Heal, with Hillary Doerries, Modern Episcopal Hymnody: The Hymnal 1982 in the 21st Century, with Matthew Hoch, and finally a wonderfully engaging session by Paul Westermeyer on the genesis, trials and tribulations of publishing a set of essays by himself and David W. Music: Church music in the United States, 1760-1901. [I've gotten only as far as the first essay, but am tremendously impressed with the denominational breadth of coverage. [Highly recommended!] A highlight of the annual conferences is always the daily Hymn Festival, often coordinated with a Plenary, which were very well organized and presented: 1) When the Storms of Life Are Raging, 2) Down by the Riverside: Jazz and Congregational Song, 3) Shiru L'Adonai: a Feast of Jewish Congregational Song, 4) Hymns, Spirituals and Gospel Song in the African American Experience, 5) [I had to miss this closing one because of plane schedules] "The Big Easy". (Content of the plenaries often appears as a major feature in The Hymn, the Society's quarterly publication.)

The weather should be cooler at next year's conference July 17-21 at the University of Redlands, California.

Are you a member of the Hymn Society? If you are a church musician, you ought to be: (<http://www.thehymnsociety.org/#!/membership/cxuo>) Individual - \$75, Two year - \$140, Retired - \$65/year. Conference registration information will be online Jan/Feb.

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NOTES FROM THE CHAPLAIN

The front page of our January 2015 "The American Organist" bears a picture of the new organ at Zion Church of the City of Baltimore. I had the honor of playing this beautiful instrument for a German and an English service two Sundays this summer in this historic Lutheran Church. "So, how did you get that gig," our Dean asked me?

Zion member, my friend Bonnie Brobst, widow of my Church history professor invited me to substitute for their organist. It's one of those "church things" where *connections* bring further *connections*. After the Memorial service at Zion for Professor Rev. Dr. Eric W. Gritsch, I returned home to find a recording of his Good Friday sermons from my pastoral internship in 1993 in York, PA. I transcribed these powerful sermons—a full Christian theology—to text and Bonnie and I edited them. "Good Friday's Good News—Meditations for the Mean Meantime" published by Cascade Books, 2014, (and a wonderful friendship with Bonnie) are the fruits of this labor of love.

Dr. Gritsch preached from 3x5 cards with a few quotes so this became an addition to his published body of work as Luther scholar, Church historian, and pastor. That Good Friday, April 9, 1993, was the anniversary of the day Dietrich Bonhoeffer died in 1945. Dr. Gritsch proclaimed the Gospel through the eyes of Luther, Bonhoeffer, and of course Gritsch—the former Austrian "Hitler Youth." With impressionistic illustrations by an Austrian friend and invitations to reflection for each "Word" by Bonnie, this little book provides a wonderful personal devotion or a congregational study—especially for Lent.

I commend this little volume to you (a CD of the sermons is available) for your personal and congregational use—with plenty of time to plan for Lent. It is my hope that as your AGO Chaplain I may be of service to you as we serve in our various church vocations where music, as Martin Luther said, is a handmaid to theology. Let's keep those church "*connections*" going.



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DID YOU KNOW?

Over this past summer, many members of the Guild had opportunities to perform in recitals and programs. Your editor would like to take this opportunity to tell you about an exciting program in which I was privileged to participate.

One of Richmond's unique treasures was made available to members of the local chapters of the American Guild Of Organists and the Old Dominion Theatre Organ Association this past August as local organists were invited to play the historic instrument made popular by organists Eddie Weaver, and Nick Pitt at the iconic Carpenter Center. On August 1st, the management of Center Stage allowed the Carpenter's grand Wurlitzer console to make a rare appearance for a special recital by four local theatre organists. The program was followed by an open console for AGO and Old Dominion Organ Society members. Featured as one of the performing theatre organ recitalists, was yours truly. Since I have been in Richmond, I have been fortunate to have had opportunities to play the organ at the Byrd, but this was my first opportunity to perform before an audience on the former Loew's Wurlitzer. The thrill of playing a large theatre organ in the true acoustical setting of a 1920s atmospheric theater, brought back fond memories of my nights playing the "Mighty Wonder Morton" at the New Orleans Saenger. Many thanks to the management of Center Stage for making this program available to our local organ society chapters, and to my colleagues Bob Gulledege, Nick Pitt and Jim Reinhart with whom I shared the stage.
